

For many, the motto during the pandemic has been 'keep calm and carry on.' At Talbot Heath our motto has been 'keep calm and forge ahead. 'The fact that the school has superb digital provision (with every pupil being provided with an iPad from Reception onwards as part of their learning tools), combined with our extensive preparations pre-lockdown, meant that we switched seamlessly into full remote provision for every pupil aged 3-18.

Our pupils had the knowledge, resilience and independence to stay on top of all their learning, following a full timetable each day, including all practical and creative subjects. They have realised that adversity does not prevent creativity and progress. In fact, quite the opposite is the case. They can now perform live on stage or create and edit a virtual performance, they can present live on Zoom, sharing documents with ease and confidence, they can model in 3D or place themselves in virtual worlds of dinosaurs, rainforests and oceans. This generation of TH pupils will step into our brave new world with skills, knowledge and confidence, keen to embrace the future and all the challenges it might bring.

During the pandemic we have developed a partnership with CGApprentice (experts in game design, computer animation and 3D sculpting), established a cricket partnership with Winton Cricket Club, devised a new design module for our pupils to learn how to design and build sustainable housing projects on CAD and BIM, digitised our school archive to use as a wonderful teaching resource, written a whole school outdoor learning curriculum and devised interactive lessons that incorporate virtual reality in History, Geography, Maths, Ethics and Music.

Our GCSE and A Level pupils excelled, attaining superb results and accessing their university courses of choice. All of this has been done while managing the many challenges of Covid-19, which is a testament to our determination to do far more than carry on. My sincere thanks go to the superb team of staff at the school for ensuring that our pupils have continued to flourish in the most extraordinary of times. Our school was founded to be pioneering and progressive and we look forward to blazing a trail into the future.





Junior School Head's Report

The academic year 2020-2 I began with a real sense of optimism and purpose. Having re-opened so successfully during the final weeks of the Summer Term, all staff and pupils were eager and confident to get back to some sort of normality and start afresh.

Part of my underlying vision for the Junior School is to ensure our pupils are prepared for their future, in whatever form that may take. It is vital we enable your daughters to acquire the transferrable skills and knowledge they will need to thrive within the experiences and challenges that lie ahead.

Part of this vision is the need to utilise our beautiful site, in order to learn how to look after our planet and the environmental context in which we live. I want our pupils to learn how to use and reuse the precious resources that we have around us. I am delighted that with the guidance of Mrs Diment, our Outdoor Learning Coordinator, we built a vegetable garden, which our

pupils planted and tended carefully and were able to successfully harvest vegetables, flowers and seeds. A new forest trail has been made behind the Jubilee Hall and we were awarded a grant from the Hanson Trust to develop our outdoor areas.

In November, we hosted Stewart McPherson, a world-renowned naturalist, author and photographer, as he led a global ecological lesson from our Hub. Our pupils made insect hotels with the support of our Head of Science, Mrs Brown, which was watched by schools from around the world.

Our Interdisciplinary Curriculum was further developed and all year groups benefited from STEAM Events in the Hub. Year 4 enjoyed being Romans for the day under the direction of Caesar Morrisio and Centurion Dobbius Careless. (Mr Morris and Mr Dobree-Carey). In December, Year 5 dressed in their finery as Victorians - the Mary Norton Hall was turned into the large drawing room of 'Lord and Lady Talbot', complete with roaring log fire and natural decorations from the woods. The girls entertained each other with poetry and musical recitals. They were served sandwiches, cakes and drinks throughout by butlers Walrond and Pidgley.





During this term, we were working a blended system, with some lessons and activities being live, but also using Zoom and Google Classroom for many virtual events, including the Pre-Prep Nativity and meetings. There was a real sense that we were entering a new era in education, where technology enabled a curriculum to be delivered virtually. Some research articles even started to contemplate a future of centralised lesson delivery across all schools!

In January, just before the start of spring term, we received the news that we were to shut the following day. The amazing Junior School staff I have the privilege to lead really showed their mettle and by the following morning we had a 'drive thru' system up and running, so that every pupil had the equipment she needed to go into a second period of online learning. Our key worker provision started and we adapted every lesson, every assembly and as many activities as possible for this platform of learning. As a result, our pupils were able to keep up and not catch up.

Throughout the remainder of the Spring and Summer terms, we were able to return to school, remain open, avoid sporadic closures and able to provide 'live' teaching to each and every pupil. Our year finished with a magical Harry Potter potions experience, a Year 5 and 6 production of 'The Lion King,' a Year 3 Trip to the Etches Collection and Smedmore House and a Year 6 Prize Giving, which was the first event for which we were able to invite parents back onto the school site.

The Spring Term saw Mrs Mathieson start her maternity leave and we were delighted to welcome Miss Lane to the staff. We also welcomed three lunchtime supervisors to our team, Mrs Harty, Mrs Johnson and Mrs Cockrem. Mrs Cockrem also joined our after school care team.

As a Junior School Head teacher, this year confirmed my belief and commitment to the absolute necessity of face to face human interaction. Alongside the technology, our children need the spontaneity of action and the companionship of their peers and teachers, in order to learn, feel valued and be nurtured. The same is true as adults; as a staff we have learned to fully value the importance of being a team and the easy exchange of ideas and information that comes through physically meeting together. As our use of and reliance on technology becomes ever more prominent, I believe the necessity of care, support and real companionship becomes ever more important and remains at the heart of everything we do here at Talbot Heath.

ENGLISH ANDTHEATRE STUDIES

The English and Theatre Studies Faculty consider it important to provide curriculum enrichment for all students and offer a wide range of activities. This has clearly been difficult during the pandemic. In adapting our teaching approaches to meet the challenges of Covid-19, both the English and Drama Departments are extremely proud of the work that we have done.

The 'Read for Good' annual sponsored read raised £246. Since the beginning of the challenge in 2000, the school has raised over £19,000 for this excellent charity. The charity's aim is to motivate children to read for fun, to help support school and local libraries, and to bring the power of stories into all 30 of the UK's major children's hospitals via mobile bookcases and resident storytellers. It also supports Roald Dahl's Marvellous Children's Charity, CLIC Sargent, Together for Short Lives and Readwell, which all aim to alleviate problems faced by children with an illness by providing specialist nurses, social and medical workers, and support for the family.

It was pleasing to welcome an actor from the Globe Theatre in during the Summer term to run workshops on 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'. The expertise of the workshop leader was excellent and provided the students with an insight into the historical environment in which the plays took place as well as affording them the opportunity to experiment with the intricacies of Shakespearean language.

Clare Boyington contributed to the wider school community significantly by arranging a day of talks and activities with comedian, activist and charity fundraiser Eddie Izzard. Pupils from across the school had the opportunity to engage with Eddie in a meaningful break from the challenges of learning during the pandemic.

This year, we launched the Newspaper Club. This is led by a dedicated group of 6th Form pupils and meets every Tuesday after school. They produce a regular school newspaper that is shared widely amongst the school community. Pupils from Upper 3 all the way up through the school contribute to the publication.

In addition to the English support that pupils receive in class, we also run dedicated intervention sessions for pupils. These sessions target pupils who have been identified by their class teacher as needing some additional literacy support. There is a dedicated session in a lunchtime for pupils in Upper 3, Lower 4 and Upper 4.

The Drama Department ordinarily run a variety of activities and workshops for KS3 students. However, with Covid-19 restrictions in place and remote learning, this was not possible during the year. We did however continue to develop strong links with theatre companies such as Gecko, and A Level students had the opportunity to undertake an online workshop with Gecko streamed digitally into the Drama Studio and delivered by Chris Evans. It was a fantastic workshop and the techniques explored have since been used to create outstanding devised work. The GCSE and A Level students had the opportunity to watch productions that were digitally streamed in order to gain further understanding of their techniques and philosophies on theatre making. Productions included 'Jane Eyre' and 'Twelfth Night', originally performed at the National Theatre. The opportunities to watch such productions has been further extended with a subscription to Digital Theatre Plus and plans are in place to show a variety of performances on the cinema screen in the auditorium.

MATHS

Congratulations to all of our girls who have been awarded certificates in the recent UKMT (United Kingdom Mathematical Trust) Maths Challenges. Three Maths challenges are taken throughout the year; Senior, Intermediate and Junior challenges. The challenges involve answering multiple-choice questions, which are very demanding. As well as mathematical knowledge learnt in class, they involve lateral thinking and logic. Fun for anyone who enjoys a puzzle or a challenge!

JUNIOR MATHS CHALLENGE

We saw great success in the Junior Maths Challenge competition for Year 7 and 8 pupils. Bronze, Silver and Gold certificates are awarded to students who perform in the top 40% of pupils nationally so our 18 winners have done superbly well to get their awards; demonstrating the excellent potential of our girls in Mathematics. The gold certificate winners qualified for the follow-on round of the competition.

JUNIOR KANGAROO

In an amazing display of Mathematical dexterity, Sophie Hobby (L4) was awarded a Merit. This competition is the follow-on round to the Junior Maths Challenge, so only the top scorers are allowed to enter. Scoring a Merit is an indication of fantastic ability in Mathematical problem solving.

INTERMEDIATE MATHS CHALLENGE

The U4 and L5 girls performed brilliantly. They showed a combination of skills including logical thinking, problem solving and application of a range of mathematical concepts. We are thrilled to see that a large number of these pupils have been awarded certificate in recognition of their performances. The gold certificate winners also qualified for the follow-on rounds for high scorers.

INTERMEDIATE MATHS OLYMPIAD

Dori scored so highly in the Intermediate Maths Challenge that she qualified for the prestigious Intermediate Olympiad, meaning she was in the top 600 in her age category out of more than 100,000 entries. Dori also achieved a Merit in the Intermediate Olympiad - a truly outstanding achievement! For context this is a 2 hour written paper where you are only expected to answer 2 or 3 out of the 7 questions because they are so challenging. Dori managed to get full marks on one question and at least some marks for 5 others.

SENIOR MATHS CHALLENGE

The Senior Maths Challenge for L6 and U6 pupils is a true test of Mathematical prowess and we are so thrilled to have a group of girls with real talent in the subject who participated in the competition. On top of this, some of them were able to achieve a bronze or silver award, which shows that they have overcome some complex mathematical problems only achievable with a sound understanding of the subject. Well done, girls!

SCIENCE

Another academic year posed many logistical problems. Practical science taught through Zoom is not easy but teachers and students responded with home based experiments, videos, voice overs, and You Tube channels. There is no substitute for the real thing but in difficult circumstances students continued to learn. With necessity being the mother of invention, many new approaches have been carried back into school and are being used to complement laboratory based learning.

Assigning grades was tough with students having missed two huge chunks of school based learning through lockdowns, but everyone got through it. Exam classes in Upper 6 and Upper 5 all received the grades allocated by their teachers.

Talbot Heath students start GCSE science in Year 9 and we wanted to help students prepare for their GCSE studies. It was decided that from September 2021 all Year 8 students would be taught science in seperate classes for Biology, Chemistry and Physics, with specialist teachers, instead of more broadly as Science.

The Year 9 students ran a biology exposition on the human biology topics covered that year. They produced displays, models, presentations, booklets and interactive experiences. Their final works were presented in the Hub for the faculty staff, where staff and pupils could engage with the exhibitions they created. It was a tremendous success and we plan to run it annually.

A Level students took part in the British Olympiad Chemistry national competition run by Oxford University, designed to stretch and challenge their science knowledge. F Rowley gained a silver award and T Ratnayake a bronze award.

As ever, Mrs Heathman Abbott took any opportunity to organise a science bake off.

MODERN LANGUAGES

CLASSICS

GEOGRAPHY

Outdoor fieldwork opportunities have played a much less significant role in our provision since March 2020. We have, however, adapted and continued online with the Dorset branch of the Geography Association. In lockdown, L6 and U6 were also able to enjoy some excellent virtual conferences over Adobe Connect technology to access such topics as 'latest developments in carbon technology, how to write more effectively for A Level, human rights, carbon and water cycles, all led by renowned authors David Holmes and Bob Digby.

We adapted our course for U4, investigating 'life after lockdown' and conducting online surveys to collect primary data about how shopping habits have changed. This has enabled students to investigate their local area in a Covid-19 secure way and assess whether 'localism' was replacing 'globalism' as people adjusted to life during the pandemic.

L4 were unable to visit the Living Rainforest as usual at the start of the year. We organised 'virtual' fieldtrips with the help of headsets and Google Expeditions to Rio de Janerio and Sao Paulo in Brazil. We could see, in 360 degrees, the Christ the Redeemer statue, Copacabana beach and imagine what life was like for people living in the skyscrapers and slums.

Despite the enormous challenges of such an unprecedented year with disruptions to teaching and learning over Zoom, the students' diligence, resilience and hard work paid dividends in the summer with a superb set of A Level and GCSE centre assessed



grades. They should be highly commended on their results.

COMPUTING

In the Autumn term, pupils from Year 3 to U4 took part in the annual Bebras Challenge, competing against schools across the world on Computational Thinking challenges. Some of our girls reached the top 10% in the country. We launched a digital poppy challenge for Remembrance Day for Juniors and Seniors and had over 120 beautiful drawings submitted, demonstrating impressive digital creativity.

The Spring term once again saw a period of remote learning so events were put on hold until we returned to school. We celebrated Safer Internet Day with Y6 girls earning certificates for completion of the Google 'Be Internet Legends' course.

During the Summer term we were able to make use of our robotics equipment, and the interactive wall and floor in the Hub. Lower 4 programmed the Sphero Bolts to navigate a maze projected onto the floor, and one group choreographed a lights routine with the Spheros moving in formation to spell out the letters TH changing from red to blue. Upper 4 took part in the Drone Time Trials using their iPads to control them, culminating in an end of year race, making use of floor and wall projections, lights and music — they very much enjoyed it and showed off some excellent agility skills and control of their drones with impressive times.

U4 completed their Bronze iDEA Award, with some earning the Silver certificate as well.

ECONOMICS

Economics continues to be a popular choice at A Level, the school ethos is to foster mutual respect and understanding, and Economics does this on both inter personal and wider levels. The girls are encouraged to respect the points of view of a variety of key economics agents, individuals, business and the government, and to discuss topical issues of economic, business and social importance from an impartial but informed viewpoint.

The economy is recovering and expected to reach pre-crisis levels at the beginning of 2022. Output is expected to rise moderately in 2022 at 4.7% and 2.1% in 2023. Consumption is the main driving force. Business investment will improve but is still being hindered by uncertainty of the UK trading from outside of a trading block. Increased border costs and bureaucracy are weighing on UK imports and exports with the EU members. Inflation is rising due to energy and supply chain issues, with a peak predicted for early 2022 and a return to the target rate of 2% inflation by 2023. On the bright side, unemployment is continuing to decline.

There has been much change in our economy over the past few years, with the impact of Brexit and Covid-19, and this makes economics an exciting and challenging subject. Our students are currently enjoying the dynamic nature of economics and trying to predict what government macro-economic policies will come next - all very exciting.

Let's see what 2022 brings the UK economy - fingers, toes and eyes all crossed!

PSYCHOLOGY

Psychology continues to be one of the most popular A Level choices at sixth form, with a number of students going on to study the subject at degree level.

Despite the periods of lockdown and remote learning, students showed exceptional resilience and adaptability in their learning. L6 students were able to design and conduct their own memory experiments via Zoom, analysing the data they collected and writing scientific reports of their research. U6 students worked incredibly hard to produce strong evidence supporting the award of some excellent A Level grades.

When we were back in the classroom, we took the opportunity to do activities and experimental work, such as the mirror drawing task (used to show that amnesic patients can still learn new skills even though they do not recall having done a task before). In the summer term, the three Psychology Prefects also helped with a taster day for Year 10 students to give them an insight into the functions of different areas of the brain.

PSRE

ART & DESIGN

personal work into competitions and exhibitions such as Young Artist of the year. Sadly, we were not successful this year but perseverance is a key trait to Art and we will see what exciting opportunities the coming year offers.

CAREERS ADVICE

During the autumn term, the Head of Careers interviewed all U5 and U6 students to discuss their future plans after GCSE's and A Levels. Students were given information, advice and support for the next stage of their education and possible career paths. Some students then met with an Independent Careers Adviser from Ansbury, who was able to provide further support. These meetings helped our students to consolidate their ideas and finalise their plans.

CAREERS CONVENTION

The Covid pandemic and the huge range of restrictions on schools and the general public caused the cancellation of this BCP community event. We hope that this will return in 2021.

NATIONAL CAREERS WEEK

After the second lockdown, schools re-opened on the 8 March 2021, just one week after the 10 year Anniversary of National Careers Week. While the restrictions on public meetings hampered school meetings, TH assemblies have continued to delight our school community via Zoom. So while the pandemic brought cancellations for many careers experiences, we were able to host various online assemblies and provide careers

information links to our students working remotely.

The pandemic forced all of us to think differently and for the world of careers this has enabled companies and public organisations to arrange incredible online experiences for our students; experiences they can enjoy wherever they are in the world. Many careers exhibitions and work experience / internships have moved to virtual events; the positive impact of Covid-19 is that our students, from U3 to U6, can enjoy careers opportunities previously restricted by geography. The Head of Careers collates these opportunities and informs students and Tutors of events for their year group.

RECORDS OF ACHIEVEMENT

All students in Senior School experience Careers lessons, weekly or fortnightly. They each have a Record of Achievement file, where they track their academic progress, review their personal targets and celebrate their skills and achievements, including certificates from extra-curricular activities. The weekly sixth form Enrichment programme includes careers education and support, which prepares them for their future beyond Talbot Heath.

TEXTILES

DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY

The year started with a lot of enthusiasm from staff, pleased to be back in the classroom once again after lockdown. It did, however, prove to be a very challenging year with the introduction of stringent regulations for teaching practical lessons. However, whilst other schools cancelled their practical curriculum, we felt it was vital to offer our students the opportunity to be creative.

Girls in Pre-Prep had great fun in their STEAM lessons and covered a range of different topics through practical activities. They included learning about motion, building stable structures and teamwork in our Lego 10 pin bowling alley as well as understanding gravity and balance with our fun packed zip line (even Mrs Stone couldn't resist):

Year 3 pupils covered a range of different projects, learning how to use basic tools and equipment safely and accurately. Year 4 pupils loved learning how to use our compressed air rocket launcher to make spacecraft and racing cars, and took part in our first Year 4 Rocket Racers competition.

Year 5 students made their own bedside night-lights and some amazing Tudor themed puppets with Mrs Heath. Year 6 pupils crafted their own one string musical Diddley Bows, and some very effective seaside village scenes from scrap wood.

Pupils in U3 modelled their own buildings using CAD and in October we started using our virtual reality headset which allows the girls to step inside their own buildings.

L4 learned how to model plant and animal cells using CAD and they learned how to create 3D topographical reliefs using CAD and 3D printing. Pandemic or not, December brought the return of the annual Christmas Cake Decorating Competition, albeit virtual. A remarkable 41 entries were received, from Reception to U6. Again, the whole school community were able to have their say via our iPad voting system. The overall winners were Bella Harris in the Junior School for her Winter Wonderland Cake and Chloe Hannam in the Senior School for her gravity defying Christmas Pudding. The seamless switch to remote learning in the spring term saw me Zooming into kitchens all over the county. Whilst some pupils preferred to have me on hand for quick tips and pointers, others made excellent use of the independent skills they had developed in the classroom, and screen shared images of their creations. Virtual 'Star Baker' awards, it seems, are just as sought after as the real thing!

Undeterred by the absence of physical cooking clubs and competitions, we used our iPads to our advantage by running virtual sugar paste club which ran for 8 weeks over the remote learning period. Many of our most enthusiastic cake decorators, including a regular group of keyworker students, zoomed into the sessions and we worked our way through creating a



selection of different flowers including daisies, roses and finally, daffodils, in anticipation of Spring.

Several of our budding young chefs amongst the keyworker students got creative in the classroom and entered the

Tunnock's Teacake Challenge and Aldi's Taste Kitchen Challenge, designing original recipes, inspired by Team GB, heading off to Tokyo for the delayed 2020 Olympics.

During the summer, the Year 12 girls spent part of their Life Skills Day in the



Food Room, brushing up on their practical food skills ready for university life. They worked in groups making everything from Thai green curry and spaghetti bolognaise to naan and garlic bread. The results were delicious and many discovered that cooking is not so difficult and can even be fun!

SPORT

Talbot Heath pupils across the whole school have continued to have an excellent year of sport, in and outside of school, considering the ongoing adjustments pupils have had to make to their training and competitive seasons. It is brilliant to see such variety, with National and International successes in many sports including athletics, biathlon, cross-country, chess, cricket, equestrian, golf, netball, rowing, sailing, swimming and tennis. Pupils have reached County level or above in no less than 12 different sports this year.

Our Junior School girls have impressed with their engagement and commitment to their sport in and out of school. Pupils experience a broad range of sports in PE lessons which this year have included some different activities to meet the additional Covid-w19 measures including swimming, badminton, netball, hockey, tennis, cricket, rounders, athletics, and the use of the fitness suite. They have also produced National representatives



and County Champions along the way. Students have participated in community activities such as Year 6 attending sports leadership training.

Pupils have missed the opportunity and experience of playing in matches against local schools, but they have been involved in virtual competitions which have included skills challenges, fitness tasks, and virtual running races against other local schools. They particularly enjoyed competing against their teachers in the 'beat the teacher' challenges which were part of their PE lessons.

In Senior School PE, we have continued to push the boundaries with the aim of a broad and balanced curriculum which prepares Talbot Heath pupils for lifelong physical activity habits. This year we have continued to embed some new sports with the opportunity to develop their skills and experience further in clubs such as football, handball, and table tennis. We continued to promote National Fitness Day, raising awareness of the importance of our health and wellbeing.

Our Sports Scholars programme continued on Zoom with a variety of talks and workshops from guest speakers such as GB triathlete Izzy Davis, Olympic Javelin thrower Goldie Sayers and Olympic weightlifter Sarah Davis.

In Sailing, Eliana and Lila Edwards were both successful, representing well at the British Championships. Lila was selected to compete for GB in the World Championships in Italy where she finished 27th girl Under 15.

In Chess, Larissa was invited to play in the Wiltshire U18 chess team. She also represented well at the UK Delancey Chess Challenge in which she qualified for the Terafinals finishing in the top 229 amongst competitors across all ages in the country.

Larissa is currently ranked 13th as an U13 girl.

In Athletics we had 9 County champions across different age groups and events. Emily Parker had a fantastic season, highlights including coming 2nd at the English Schools Championships and securing her first international vest running for GB U20 team at the Loughborough Invitational meet - fantastic opportunity and landmark moment for her. Erin Wells continues to excel with her running but has also applied herself in Biathlon. She has qualified to represent GB at the World and European Championships after finishing 2nd at the National Championships this year.

Many girls play tennis with their club and continue to show real potential at County and Regional championships. The standard of these competitions grows each year and we are very proud of the girls. The U19 A team qualified for the Aberdare National finals.

I'd like to thank our students for their hard work, commitment and fantastic contribution to school sport. Even under the unusual circumstances, I have yet again been amazed by the dedication and drive that Talbot Heath students have demonstrated. Thank you to the parents for their continued support throughout a difficult time, encouraging their daughter to take ownership of their health and wellbeing. It has been a fantastic year in both achievement and enthusiasm, considering the circumstances. We continue to be in an excellent position with good club links in many sports, including netball and tennis, alongside our Talbot Heath Swimming Academy and Cricket partnership with Winton CC, which has been a successful venture this year, encouraging more women and girls into cricket. Sport at Talbot Heath is in a heathy and exciting place and we look forward to future stories of success that will come to fruition.
